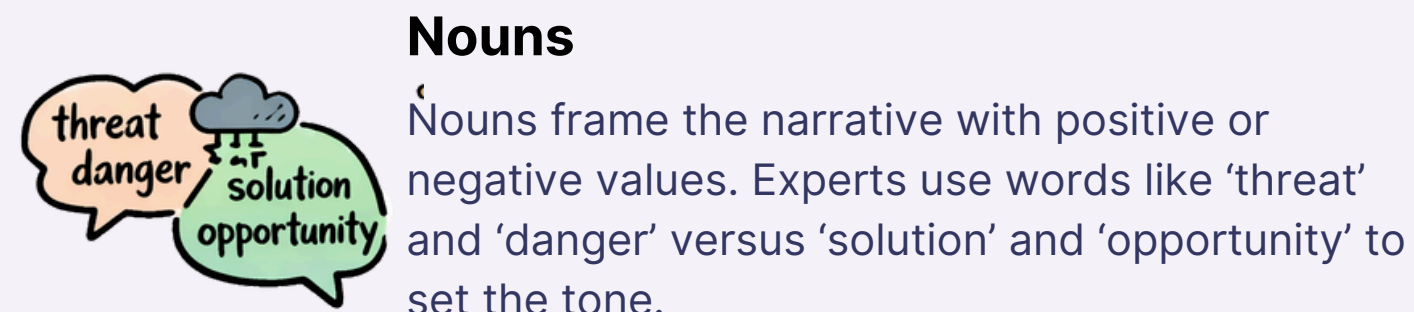
Attitude Markers: How Experts Show Their Stance



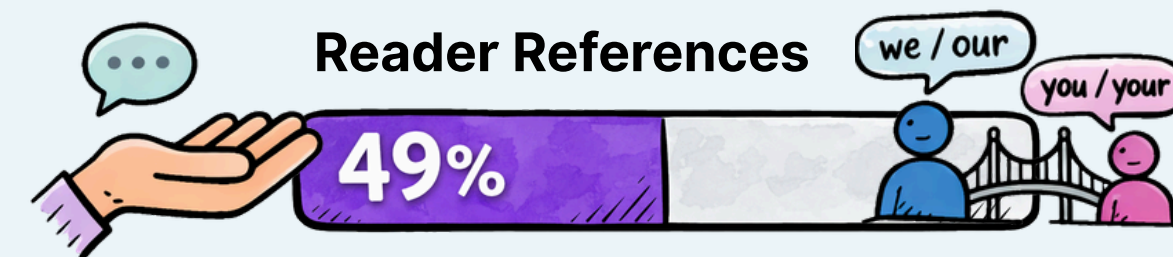
Adjectives are the #1 tool to convey evaluation. Words like 'concerning,' 'delicate,' 'best,' and 'surprising' signal the expert's judgment.



Adverbs add nuance and expressivity. They modify statements with words like 'partially' or 'necessarily' to show careful positioning.



Engagement Markers: How Experts Involve the Reader



Reader references create a direct connection. Using 'we' and 'our' fosters shared responsibility, while 'you' and 'your' directly address the reader.



'Code Glosses' bridge the knowledge gap. Experts define jargon, rephrase complex ideas, and use examples to ensure clarity.



Directives

Directives guide the reader's thinking and action. Phrases like 'consider,' 'imagine,' and 'read more' prompt readers to think hypothetically or explore further.
